About Program:-

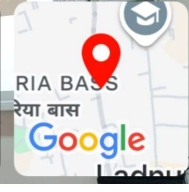

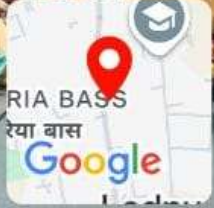
Outcomes:-
